News and Events

Cambridge Coin Show

The 28th annual show was another great success. In addition to radio ads which ran on Magic FM 106.1 the entire week, a third billboard sign was added this year and a press release was sent out to the local media. Most of the previous year's dealers were on hand along with a few new ones who hadn't been able to set up in the past replacing those who were unable to be with us.

All of the remaining promotional woods for this year were handed out by 11am. Generous attendees estimated to be in the 400 to 600 range, upon realizing that there was no admission fee, did not hesitate to empty their pockets of change or deposit a banknote into the donation jar to support the Cambridge Self Help Food Bank raising a record \$458.70. Since 2014 when the Waterloo Coin Society began hosting the popular well-attended event \$2,282.34 has been collected at the door. The Royal Canadian Numismatic Association and the CSHFB each received an additional \$250.00 from the proceeds of the show totaling \$2,800 to date, further benefiting residents and the numismatic community.

A special thank you to the many volunteers who signed up new members, greeted attendees, kept a watchful eye on the bourse floor and assisted dealers who were unloading or loading their inventory. Dealers seemed quite pleased with the turnout and really appreciated the personal assistance they received. Aside from the obvious commercial nature and small fundraiser for the club, often overlooked is the social interaction among collectors across Ontario that makes the trip worthwhile for so many attendees. Show chairman Brent Mackie reported that a large percentage of the dealers did not hesitate to pay in full and opted to keep their same tables for next year despite the last-minute change in date.

CTV News made an appearance and interviewed Brent and Maher as did *Canadian Coin News* correspondent Jeff Fournier. A member of Conestoga College's journalism program was also in attendance and comments that it was an awesome event. Next year's show has been scheduled for **March 14, 2020**, with event planning already underway. Feedback is always welcome which will help to further improve upon the success. Speak to Brent or any of the executive if you have any ideas, suggestions or wish to join the Cambridge Coin Show committee.

60th Anniversary Meeting

The special 60th anniversary meeting will long be remembered for the 80+ in attendance which as you may have already read, included prominent area politicians, visitors and representation from high profile individuals in the numismatic community. President Babbili also extended invitations to council members of the cities of Cambridge and Kitchener as we have for quite some time considered ourselves to be a regional club, however both groups were tied up in council meetings that evening.

Seeing all the smiles on everyone's faces and watching the interactions between members and special guests, it appears that we made a great impression. Peter Becker and Robb McPherson each had a display case of W.C.S. medals and artifacts on hand for everyone to view. Part of the club archives also includes bound journals dating back to 1959 which many took the opportunity to browse through. A number of member dealers including John Regitko were located at the back of the room which also attracted quite a bit of attention.

It was wonderful to hear the executive secretary of the R.C.N.A., Paul Johnson, recall many of his personal experiences with the hobby since 1965 and share how technology has impacted collectors. His presentation was very well received and touched many of the non-collectors in the room as it illustrated the glory days of the hobby from the time W.C.S. was formed. It was a nice leisurely walk down memory lane for many of the older collectors including Paul, who in addition to the recognitions noted in the March newsletter was also made a Fellow of the O.N.A. (2001) and R.C.N.A (1997) and received the Kraus Publications Ambassador Award in 2009.

Thank you to everyone who turned out to celebrate the milestone with us and those that captured the event sharing photos that were taken. The first of a two-part series written by Jesse Robitaille appeared in the April 16-29 issue of *Canadian Coin News* with additional coverage expected in the *Canadian Numismatic Journal* and *Ontario Numismatist* over the next month.

Our 671st meeting on April 9 will feature a double auction. As with all of our live monthly auctions, you must be present to participate. First introduced in September 2014 in response to member requests for more auction items, overwhelming support resulted in addition of a spring 100 lot auction. In order to focus on the club's educational mandate, these are limited to two such events annually. Lists were distributed to members by email mid-February however a small number of extra copies will be available which are normally set aside for guests and those without access to a printer.
